Every 5-year – requires public input.</p> <p>Code Red, e-Dispatch, IAM Responding or Everbridge are the alerting system that each Agency uses. Code Red could be used for notifications of all agencies of the LEPC during an emergency, however it requires buy in from the Executive Leadership teams.</p> <p>The next meeting is Friday July 21st 8:30 a.m. @ St. Vincent Mansfield Center – there is an online option.</p>

NEW BUSINESS		
Police	<p>The Billings Police Department is made up of 140 sworn police officers. The officers serve a population over 105,000 people. The officers patrol within the city limits which is approximately 41 square miles (urban with some rural). The Billings Police Department utilizes a central dispatch for police, fire, sheriff, and ambulance.</p> <p>Within the police department are several divisions, both civilian and sworn. These include Administration/Command, Patrol, Animal Control, Specialized Units, Support Services and Investigations.</p> <p>Administration/Command includes the Office of Professional Standards, the Public Information Officer and the training division. The Patrol Division has numerous specialty units, including K9, School Resource Officers, Downtown Business Alliance Officers, STEP (traffic enforcement), Parks/Recreation Officer, Billings Clinic Officers and Bike Patrol. SWAT, Hostage Negotiators and the Bomb Squad are some of the specialized police units. Civilians in the records and front desk areas comprise the Support Services Division. Investigation encompasses numerous units, including as Detectives, Crime Analysis, Street Crimes, Evidence, CCSIU/HIDTA and specialized assignments, such as DEA, ATF, US Marshals, DVI and ICAC.</p> <p>The Billings Police Department is a progressive, community-oriented police department that seeks motivated, career-minded individuals to join our team for both civilian and sworn officer positions. Applications are accepted on a continual basis.</p> <p>For sworn positions, Billings PD hires both P.O.S.T. Certified and non-certified Probationary Police Officers. Successful applicants will be placed in a hiring pool to be drawn based upon the need of the department.</p> <p>The police department has numerous civilian positions throughout different divisions within the department, including Support Services, Evidence, Professional Standards and Crime Analysis.</p>	
Fire	<p>We are... The Billings Fire Department (BFD) was first organized in 1883. BFD has 124 personnel, including firefighters, paramedics, EMTs, administrative personnel, and fire inspectors. BFD also oversees the City/County 911 Communications Center which has 37 employees.</p> <p>We proudly serve... all residents, businesses, and organizations within our response area which includes the Billings Urban Fire Service Area (BUFSA).</p> <p>Administration Department oversight with a Fire Chief, two Assistant Chiefs, and two Administrative Support staff.</p>

Call to order at 10:30 am

2. Old Business
 - a. Roster and introductions
 - b. Minutes approved
 - c. Airport Exercise Improvements
 - i. Active discussion on Improvement Plan Matrix items
 - a. See attached Matrix
 - b. Dates inserted into the Matrix are arbitrary and in effect place-holders
 - a. Individual sub-committees would be responsible for identifying a Target Date for resolution
 - i. This date can be adjusted as time goes by
 1. The target date for hospital notification for example, clearly cannot be met and the Communications sub-committee should assign a reasonable date
 - c. The proposed sub-committee assignments were accepted as shown
 - d. The descriptions are paraphrased and condensed from a variety of comments
 - e. Discussion on how to distribute the sub-committee assignment recommendations
 - a. Conclusion: LEPC will provide the Matrix to the sub-committees at next meeting
 - b. Exercise Design Sub-committee will only be responsible for managing the Matrix and maintaining relevance over time
 - c. LEPC will incorporate reminders into the regular schedule of LEPC meetings
 - d. Accountability for pursuing the improvements will be held with the LEPC
 - f. There was significant conversation on ensuring the hospitals receive timely notification of a possible or actual mass casualty incident.
 - a. How this would occur is a continuing topic of concern
 - b. This led to actively pursuing the Communications sub-committee and recruiting, if not assigning individuals to that group
 - i. Representatives from Dispatch, law enforcement, fire, hospitals and AMR should be on the committee or at least formally advising
 - ii. There was a question regarding by-laws goal statement for the Communications sub-committee and how instances of this nature fall into their purview.
 1. This will be researched and discussed at the August meeting
 - g. Victim transport management also generated a lot of conversation
 - a. How to manage the distribution of victims between the two hospitals
 - i. It should be noted that an Airport event will pose different challenges from an incident in other community situations.
 - b. It was concluded that
 - i. Discussions with relevant agencies take place to come up with a workable plan
 1. One suggestion was that Riverstone Health has access to hospital systems that might allow them to manage this function.
 - ii. In the spring time frame a tabletop exercise to test the viability of the plan
 - h. Other elements of the conversation were:
 - a. Related to victim evaluation comments collected by United Way
 - i. Important suggestions for future planning
 1. A formal pre-exercise briefing of the victims to prepare them for the realities of the exercise day
 2. Keeping the victims and responders separate in order for the responders to not "pre-condition" their response
